### “Holy Distance In”

A friend of mine recently posted: “This is more than I planned to give up for Lent this year!” She was referring, of course, to the dramatic change in life-style we have all experienced in the current pandemic. We are learning new ways of coping, new ways of being in relationships, discovering new resources in ourselves and others, even learning new language. I bet you didn’t know what a “PPE” or an N95 was until just a few weeks ago! (“Personal Protective Equipment,” think masks, gowns and gloves, and specialized masks with built-in respirators.) Most likely you now know who Dr Fauci is and that COVID 19 is a particular coronavirus, of which there are many. And you know the term “social distancing” because you are doing it.

Recently I heard Eric Law coin a new term: **“Holy Distance In.”** Try this one on for size. Law says it reframes what we are doing---staying away from each other, a response that can be based in fear. **“Holy Distance In” is honoring each other’s space and wellness, not based on fear and self-protection but love and respect and the protection for another, respecting boundaries and creating sacred space.** (Women, says Law, have been asking for this for a long time!)

**What if we started to think of the distance between us as “sacred space?” What if we maintain holy distance in order to include the other?** Law gives the example of ballroom dancing: it is the space between the dancers that makes the dance graceful and beautiful. Sometimes we get too close--physically, emotionally, to others and scare people away. Sometimes we assume others comfort or need or even right to space and charge in, taking up not only space, but failing to recognize the truth, the pain, the joy of someone else’s reality; instead, we assume it is like our own. People of privilege (that’s most of us!) are the usual offenders here. We think our ideas, our attempts to rescue, fix, provide, “help” are what others want and need when in reality we would do well to step back, to

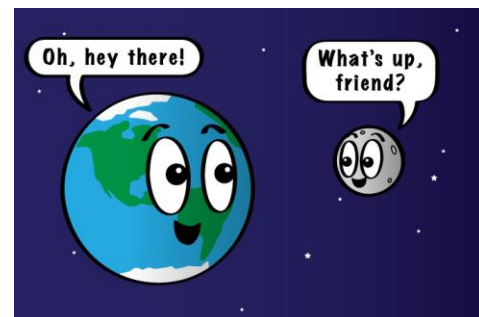
truly hear and see the “other” for who and what they are and what they can teach us.

**In this unique season, how do we make the distance between us holy, graceful and gracious?** We need to see one another from a different angle, a wider lens (Notice how live news has had to change its camera angles!) Try this:

- Pray that the space (physical, theological, emotional, cultural, etc.) between you and one other specific person in your life might become holy and gracious and then discover what that means
- Reach out to someone who you feel distant from; perhaps this is a season when the two of you can recreate the “space” between you
- Call someone you haven’t spoken to in a long time; invite God to create holy and gracious space between you
- Initiate a conversation by voice, text, email, letter with someone of a different race, ethnicity, educational or theological background, orientation, gender, country of origin, etc. and allow God to create a holy and gracious space between you in order to listen and really hear another’s life story, point of view.
- Use the space you have in your life (now that you are not commuting, running to meetings, going to the store) to create a holy space for God’s presence, mindfully, intentionally deepening your sense of being in God’s presence.

We can fall apart or we can create holy distance within and between us--space the Spirit of God can transform into life-giving, life-shaping moments and relationships. Be creative! Be open! Make this a time of nurturing respectful, honoring, loving relationships in order to include others.

### Palm Sunday, April 5:

#### We will worship LIVE at 10:30 via Zoom

Join us and feel free to share the link with friends or family members. You need only an internet connection to be present; you can “come in” with audio only, or if your device allows you, audio and video. (Even though this would normally be a “first Sunday communion service, we will not have communion on Palm Sunday; we will have it Maundy Thursday; see next paragraph)

### Maundy Thursday, April 9:

#### Live Worship via Zoom, 7 pm

This will be a quiet service of scripture, readings, music and communion. In order to be prepared to share in communion **you will need to have something to drink and something to eat that will serve as “communion”**. As Baptists, we believe that the elements representing bread and cup are symbols; you can use whatever you have. These symbols remind us of the physical suffering of Jesus, in which we share keenly during this time of pandemic.

### Easter Sunday, April 12:

#### Live Worship via Zoom at 10:30 am

The promise of resurrection and new life is more powerful than ever amid the suffering of these days. Join us as we worship in song and word, celebrating the abiding presence of God and the life God gives us, here, now, in the midst of these world-changing days.

## Zoom! To Gather Online With FBC



We have been holding meetings, weekly prayer and learning community and now some worship online via an application called Zoom. Last week we had 30 people online all at the same time, talking and seeing each other virtually. (You can choose to turn off your camera; if your computer doesn't have a camera, you can still participate by

listening and speaking). If this technology is new for you (it was for me just a few weeks ago!) or you are unsure if you know how to get on Zoom or what your computer does or doesn't have, please contact Kristi at [office@fbcpottstown.org](mailto:office@fbcpottstown.org) or Marcia (610-585-4322 or [marciabbailey@gmail.com](mailto:marciabbailey@gmail.com)) or Mike Heniz ([michael.william.heinz@gmail.com](mailto:michael.william.heinz@gmail.com)) to get help, **preferably before Sunday morning!** We can walk you through the process, help manage your computer, and give you a chance to do a "dry run" before you really want to get on! (Note: It's difficult to manage this *while* we are also running a worship service or learning opportunity)

**Use these tips to "gather" online in the next Zoom service/meeting with FBC:**

1. Check the FBC website or your update email from FBC for the link to the Zoom gathering. One is sent/posted on Fridays.
2. Click on the link from the device you'd like to use to join the meeting.
  - a. If you've used Zoom before, you will be taken directly to the meeting. You may have to wait a few moments as Pastor Marcia starts the meeting on her end.
  - b. If you've never used Zoom, you will be prompted to download the app. Zoom will lead you through the process, and it usually only takes moments. Do it!
  - c. If you want to download the application in advance, just click on the link any time and go through the process. You will be able to reconnect when the time for the meeting comes by clicking the link again.
3. If you want to enable your video (so people can see you), make sure your computer or device camera is active and pointing at you. Then look on the bottom left-hand corner of the Zoom window. Find the video camera icon and make sure it is activated. (If it has a slash through it you have it turned off; click the video camera icon at the bottom-left of the Zoom window to turn it on).
4. Be sure your sound is active: at the bottom-left corner of the Zoom window you will see a microphone icon beside the video camera icon. If there is a slash through the microphone icon you are muted. Click the microphone icon to make your audio active.

During this time of physical distancing, you can keep up with folks by phoning, emailing or sending a card or letter. You could remember those of our congregation whose ability to get out is usually limited:

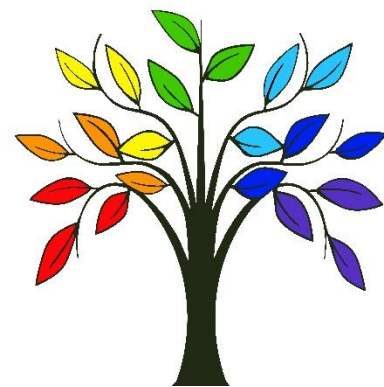
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
