

### What's on Your Bedside Table? (aka Lenten Worship Mashup)



If you want to get to know someone, ask the question, "what's on your bedside table?" You may recoil, thinking "that's too personal" but the answer can provide a glimpse into people's lives. Medication tells you something about a person's health; an eye mask or anti-snoring device might tell you about their sleep habits. Pictures give a clue to who's precious to this person. And reading material gives a glimpse into what thoughts and ideas currently fill their mind. It was a realization of what was on my bedside table that led to our Lenten Worship Series this year.

Most nights I read before turning off the light. Recently I found that a constellation of books and magazines had migrated to my bedside table, and I had been alternately reading through them all at the same time. There was a copy of the latest "Time" magazine. There was Henri Nouwen's book *In the Name of Jesus: Reflections on Christian Leadership*. On the pile was *Dare to Lead: Brave Work. Tough Conversations. Whole Hearts* by sociologist Brene Brown. Down toward the bottom of the stack is a book on contemporary missiology. And somewhere in the middle, a mystery that I have forgotten the details of (and so hence can never solve!) and a historical novel about Venice. While I think I can honestly say that the novels only direct influence on our worship series may have been creativity, my Lenten mashup came to light as the ideas and themes emerging from Nouwen and Brown directly addressed the reality exposed in

"Time" magazine. We live in a society where power, influence and wealth direct and control the world. Those who have it, use it with willful abandon; those who don't slip farther and farther into an abyss of poverty, suffering, oppression and ill health. What can we, who call ourselves by the very name of Christ, do to effect change? Who and what are we called to be?

Our Lenten Worship theme is "Cultivating a Deeper Life", a life lived not on the surface, buffeted by the winds and wills of those in power and control, but a *deeper* life, a more *significant* life, a more *meaningful* life powered by prayer and service in the likeness of Jesus. Motivated not by the world's values but by the love of God, we enter into a life-shaping transformation when we strive to incorporate not only Jesus' words but actions into our daily living, as he responds to temptation, serves friends and strangers alike, bears witness to truth and risks everything for Love's sake. Through the lens of the biblical text, the spiritual writings of Nouwen, the sociological studies of Brown and our own experience, find yourself invited to choose to live a life more deeply rooted in God's love. **You are God's beloved; start by really believing that!**

## Our Journey Toward the Philadelphia Baptist Association



As a congregation we recently voted to apply for membership in the Philadelphia Baptist Association (PBA) choosing by doing so to leave the American Baptist Churches of Pa and De (ABCOPAD). While FBC has had a long history with ABCOPAD, it has not always been a harmonious one. FBC’s inclusive posture in relation to women in ministry and to the LGBTQ community has not found support in most of the churches in ABCOPAD over the years. Recent events have amplified this divide and so we are seeking churches to be in fellowship with that will respect our commitment to inclusion.

PBA is the oldest Baptist association in this country, having been founded in 1707. Today it consists of 128 congregations, representing more than 47,000 American Baptists in the five-county metropolitan area of the Delaware Valley. PBA churches reflect multiple cultures and worship styles, and members speak more than 13 different languages.

Dennis Landon, Myra Forrest and Marcia Bailey represented FBC at a meeting of the PBA Commission on the Ministry after submitting application materials. It was a wonderfully encouraging conversation as we shared our stories of God’s activity in our churches. The Committee voted unanimously to recommend our acceptance to the Board of Directors who will vote in mid-March. Assuming all goes well there, we will be welcomed into the **Philadelphia Baptist Association on Sat. May 2<sup>nd</sup>. Please save the date! We will want as many as possible to attend!**

## A Blast from the Past



A message on the office answering machine led to an unexpected connection to FBC's past in February. Roseann and Jim Davis reached out from Perkasio, PA to ask if we had any records or information about Jim's great great grandfather, Rev. James L Davis. The inscription on the back of Rev. Davis's pocketwatch (pictured above) reads:

"Presented to Rev Jas L Davis by the congregation of the First Baptist Church of Pottstown, Pa May 17, 1893"

A quick call to Doris Stutzman (always a great source of information) lead me to a booklet commemorating FBC's hundredth year. Rev. Davis of Bridgeport, PA was FBC's tenth pastor from 1891 to 1905. Our records say:



"This scholarly Christian minister, beloved by his church and endeared to the community at large, served for the unprecedented term of 13 years and 11 months...when ill health compelled him to relinquish the pulpit. During his pastorate 268 persons united with the church." (photo in FBC library)

Thank you to Mr. and Mrs. Davis for reaching out and sending us the additional photos of Rev. Davis and his pocketwatch. We are delighted your family was able to reconnect with the FBC family.

**Q.** Who if anyone joins you in these activities?



### The Diary of Anne Frank


Steel River Playhouse presents *The Diary of Anne Frank* this March. Important, timely, and moving – this will be an experience that won't soon be forgotten.
